President's Message

President's Message

Music is not only an art form, but also a spiritual practice that can enrich our Lenten journey. As Christians, we observe Lent as a time of preparation for Easter, through fasting, prayer, almsgiving and other disciplines. During this season, we are invited to reflect and meditate on our faith and our relationship with God and others. Music can help us do that, especially when we listen to it with intention and attention.

In the 2024 winter edition of Organ Canada, RCCO Chaplain, Rev. John-Mark Missio, writes about the importance of listening to the prelude and postlude in worship services. He notes that many people treat music as background noise, which is understandable in our busy and 'plugged-in' world. But he also challenges us to recover the gift of active listening, which can open our hearts and minds to new insights and experiences. He suggests some ways to do that, such as having a teaching moment before the service, providing music notes in the bulletin, or attending live concerts.

I would like to share with you some of the things that I do as music director and organist to help congregations connect more deeply with music in church. Sometimes I talk before the service about the pieces that I have chosen for that day, and why

they are meaningful or relevant for the season or the theme. Sometimes I tell a story about the composer or the hymn writer, and what inspired them to create their work. Sometimes I explain how the music relates to the scripture readings or the liturgy. Additionally, rather than lumping the music all together as 'The Prelude', 'The Postlude' or 'The Anthem', I always include the titles of the pieces in the bulletin, so that parishioners can follow along and appreciate them better.

For instance, this Sunday's preludes are 'Lord, Throughout These Forty Days' and 'Lamb of God, Pure and Sinless', and the postlude is 'The Only Son from Heaven'. These titles convey a message or evoke an image that can help us prepare our hearts and minds for worship. That is also why we have changed the terms 'prelude' and 'postlude' to 'Music for Meditation' and 'Music for Reflection' in our church bulletin. We also ask that congregants remain seated in silence and reverence during and after the postlude, as it is part of the worship service. Understandably, it may take some time for everyone to adjust to this practice and some may feel tempted to applaud after a particularly uplifting postlude, but we kindly request in the bulletin that everyone refrain from doing so. We also encourage folks to save their greetings and conversations for the fellowship time after the service, rather than before the opening hymn, so that we can all enter worship with a quiet and focused spirit.

Music is more than an art form; it is a spiritual prac-
